The Council's 2010 annual conference features Bill McKibben, American environmentalist, founder of 350.org and a prolific writer and dynamic speaker on global warming, alternative energy and localized economies. His talk, *EAARTH: Making a Life on a Tough New Planet*, will be based on his recent book of the same title, where he emphasizes the need for communities to act now to adjust to an earth permanently altered by climate change.

Dedication of the Bank Swallow Bend Wildlife Area

July 17, 11 a.m., Warren County

The Warren County Conservation Board will hold a dedication for their newest and largest public area, the 542-acre [Bank Swallow Bend Wildlife Area](#). The dedication ceremony starts at 11a.m. A short program will be followed by a barbeque lunch and guided wagon tours through the area. The event location will be two miles east of Indianola on Highway 92, one mile south on County Road S23, and one-half mile farther south on 168th Avenue. Bank Swallow Bend, a 542-acre wetland and upland complex, provides habitat for diverse wildlife. It will also offer a variety of public uses, including hunting, fishing, nature study, wildlife viewing and hiking. Working with the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation, the WCCB procured the property in April, 2010. Public funding for this project came from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources' Habitat Stamp program, the North American Wetlands Conservation Act and Warren County's REAP funds. EPA News Conference

July 21, Waterloo

The Environmental Protection Agency will hold a news conference July 21 at 2 p.m. at Iowa Northern Railway, 1330 Sheffield Avenue in Waterloo to highlight railroad equipment that helps reduce diesel emissions. Iowa Northern Railway was awarded a \$303,800 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant from the Iowa DNR to eliminate diesel emissions of two locomotives by wiring two rail slugs and three mother service engines to power the hauling of grain from Waterloo to Cedar Rapids. Diesel emissions reductions are estimated at 220.4 tons per year.

Missouri River Authorized Purposes Study (MRAPS) July Meetings

July 27-29, various locations

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (COE) will continue scoping meetings in July for the Missouri River Authorized Purposes Study (MRAPS). The meetings are designed to allow people to talk with the COE about how they would like this historic study to proceed. MRAPS is the first-ever review of the 1944 Flood Control Act's eight original authorized purposes. Congress directed the COE to study the Missouri River projects and review these purposes. The original purposes are: flood control, hydropower, water supply, irrigation, navigation, recreation, water quality, and fish and wildlife. The COE will report back to Congress at the end of this multi-year study for possible changes to the Flood Control Act and the uses of the Missouri River. These public meetings run from 5-8 p.m., the final hour is reserved for public comments. Those attending should be prepared to discuss why the river is important to them, and opportunities MRAPS should address. Upcoming MRAPS meetings include:

Water Quality Monitor Installed in Panora

Recent work by several agencies, organizations and individuals has resulted in a successful project that will measure and help scientists understand water quality in the Middle Raccoon River in Panora. Purchase and installation of a continuous nitrate monitor situated near Lenon Mills Dam will provide detailed knowledge of nitrate concentrations in the Middle Raccoon River. Both Panora and Des Moines Water Works (DMWW) use the Raccoon River as their source water treated for drinking. The monitor is important to the City of Panora and DMWW because nitrate can be harmful to infants that drink the water. Nitrate concentrations also are thought to effect aquatic life and play an important role in the formation of the Hypoxic Zone in the Gulf of Mexico, where nutrients from the Midwest affect the commercial fishery important to that region. The automated monitor will help Panora and DMWW manage their water treatment systems and will assist scientists studying water quality in the Raccoon and Mississippi River systems. The City of Panora, DMWW, Agriculture's Clean Water Alliance (ACWA), Raccoon River Watershed Association (RRWA), Izaak Walton League, and several generous individuals all contributed funds toward the purchase of the monitor. Lake Panorama Association (LPA) provided funding for the operation of the river flow gauge at the site and Panora Communications Cooperative provided the funds necessary to extend electrical service to the flow gauge for the water quality monitor. Experts from the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) installed the device and linked its signal to their satellite-based data system.

The Panora monitor is the fourth to be located in the Raccoon River watershed. The others are located at Sac City, Jefferson, and Van Meter. Researchers at the University of Iowa are using these same devices to monitor water quality in the Mississippi River. Data generated by the device can be accessed at:
