DIRECT TESTIMONY OF T. M. FRANKLIN COWNIE

1	Q.	What is your name and business address?
2	A.	My name is T. M. Franklin Cownie (Frank). My title is Mayor of the City of Des Moines
3		City Hall is located at 400 Robert D. Ray Dr., Des Moines, Iowa 50309.
4		
5	Q.	On whose behalf are you testifying today?
6	A.	I am testifying on behalf of the Iowa Environmental Council and Environmental Law &
7		Policy Center.
8		
9	Q.	Please describe your background.
10	A.	I have served as Mayor of Des Moines since January 2004. Prior to being elected as
11		Mayor, I was an at-large member of the Des Moines City Council for two years. I am the
12		longest serving Mayor of Des Moines.
13		
14		I have been in leadership roles in a number of national and international efforts. I am
15		currently a Trustee for the U.S. Conference of Mayors and in that capacity also serve or
16		the Executive Committee. In the past, I have been on the U.S. Conference of Mayors
17		Advisory Board and several task forces.
18		
19		During my time as Mayor, I have been particularly active on environmental and
20		sustainability issues. I created and led the Mayor's Task Force on Energy and
21		Environment, which brought together representatives from across the community to
22		collaborate on environmental and energy efficiency issues. I served on the President's
23		Task Force on Climate Preparedness and Resilience as a local official representative.

am currently on the North American representative on the Global Executive Committee for the global association of ICLEI (Local Governments for Sustainability previously the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives). I was a local delegate representing America's cities and the United States at the International Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen, Denmark in 2009. More recently, I was in Paris in December 2015 as part of the United Nations Conference of Parties climate negotiations that resulted in the historic Paris Climate Accord.

Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?

10 A. The purpose of my testimony is to support MidAmerican's proposal to construct 2000

11 MW of new wind generation in Iowa and to highlight the need for renewable energy

12 projects such as this one. I am not providing testimony on every aspect of the Wind XI

13 proposal.

- Q. MidAmerican Witness Fehrman pointed to the agreement reached at the Paris Climate Change Conference as evidence that society is transitioning to a renewable energy future. What is your response?
- A. I strongly agree that we are seeing society moving in the direction of a renewable future.

 The agreement in Paris represented national leaders coming to consensus on that vision for the future. From my perspective, local government leaders from around the world have also been actively pushing for a transition to a renewable future. Local governments around the world are on the frontline of the impacts of climate change and do not have the luxury of inaction when the effects of climate change are directly felt by their

constituents. As a consequence, local leaders have embraced efforts to reduce emissions and transition to a renewable future as a response to climate change. While at the Paris conference, approximately 450 local governments including the City of Des Moines signed a separate agreement as part of the Compact of Mayors to reduce emissions.

Q. Please explain the Compact of Mayors and Des Moines' participation in more detail.

The Compact of Mayors is a global coalition of mayors and city officials committing to reduce local greenhouse gas emissions, enhance resilience to climate change and track their progress publicly. The Compact recognizes that cities are on the frontline of the impacts from climate change and also the frontlines of actions to address it by building an energy future with renewables, energy efficiency and conservation.

As Mayor of Des Moines, I signed the Compact of Mayors on December 4, 2015. This demonstrates the commitment of Des Moines and its approximately 210,000 residents and businesses to reducing emissions and working towards a clean energy future. Specifically, Des Moines has committed to reduce carbon dioxide emissions 25% from 2012 levels by 2020 to reduce carbon emissions by 50% by 2030 and to be carbon neutral by 2050. We are also committed to tracking our progress and making it clear how we are doing on reaching these goals.

Q. How will Des Moines meet these emission reduction targets?

A. The City of Des Moines recognizes that we cannot meet these emission reduction targets on our own. It will take partnerships and collaboration with all sectors of our community from our businesses to our residents.

The City of Des Moines believes that it is important to lead by example. We have done significant work on energy efficiency and conservation. As we add and update city buildings, we look to energy efficiency to reduce our energy consumption and now have several LEED Certified Buildings. We also work with our businesses to do the same. The Wellmark BlueCross BlueShield headquarters is a great example of the business sector stepping up and implementing an energy efficient LEED platinum building. In addition, we know that many businesses have aggressive climate change pledges and clean energy goals. Our ability to provide clean energy and help companies meet sustainability goals is part of why the Greater Des Moines area has been able to attract companies like Google, Microsoft, and Facebook to the area.

We know that meeting strong emission reduction goals such as the ones the city has adopted will require significantly more renewable energy generation. One of the reasons I am confident that we could meet these ambitious emission reduction goals is that we have a strong utility partner. MidAmerican Energy is the utility for Des Moines residents and businesses. When I started as Mayor, MidAmerican's energy mix was dominated by coal with some nuclear and a small amount of wind and natural gas. In the past decade, MidAmerican has begun to make the transition to clean energy to the point where wind generates 40% of MidAmerican's energy. MidAmerican has done this while keeping

rates for customers stable. We have only had one rate increase during my twelve year tenure as Mayor while this transition to more clean energy and fewer emissions has occurred.

We will not be able to meet our emissions reductions goals without MidAmerican continuing to add more renewable generation to their portfolio. We know that Iowa has a strong wind resource. Projects like the proposed 2000 MW of wind generation in Wind XI will help meet this goal. With the extension of the federal production tax credit, there is additional benefit to ratepayers to adding wind generation now. Furthermore, we would expect MidAmerican to look at wind for any future projects as well as explore solar as costs continue to come down.

Q. What are your recommendation regarding MidAmerican's Wind XI proposal?

I support the timely approval and construction of Wind XI. Wind XI provides important economic and environmental benefits to MidAmerican ratepayers, to the City of Des Moines and to the state of Iowa. The City of Des Moines will not be able to meet its ambitious emission reduction goals without getting significantly more of our electric generation from renewable energy sources. Wind XI is exactly the type of project that we need to meet our emission goals. I support Wind XI and hope to see additional renewable energy proposals from MidAmerican in the future.
