New and Changing Staff

The Council grew to double the size of its staff in 2019. The energy program expanded, adding Jordan Oster in January as the new Energy Outreach and Advocacy Coordinator and Steve Guyer in November as the new Energy and Climate Policy Specialist. During the second half of 2019, the energy team worked to operationalize 100% lowa, an exciting new renewable energy grassroots outreach program. Raihan Rashidi joined IEC as a 100% lowa organizer in December 2019; Kristen Weaverling and Paige Penningroth began their work with 100% lowa in 2020.

In February, IEC welcomed Michael Schmidt as the Council's Staff Attorney. IEC expanded fundraising resources with the addition of Jordan Bles as the Director of Fundraising and Development in July 2019.

ADVOCACY WORK

IEC is an environmental organization focused on law and policy solutions to address our state's environmental issues to create large-scale change. We engage in this work using a multi-pronged approach: outreach and partnerships, legislative policy and rulemaking, and the courts when necessary.

The Council grew outreach and advocacy efforts throughout the year, engaging more lowans around the state in the process of advocacy and education.



Legislative Events

IEC hosted two legislative events in 2019. A new **Legislative Day** in February brought attendees to the State Capitol for Advocacy Training and a workshop followed by in-person meetings with their legislators.

On March 21 IEC held **Environmental Lobby Day** where dozens of organizations and individuals took to the Capitol Rotunda. This annual event brings together IEC members, member organizations, and partners to call on legislators to prioritize environmental issues. Representative Andy McKean, Senator Claire Celsi, Mollie Aronowitz with Peoples Land Management Company, and Todd Miller with 1 Source Solar joined IEC for remarks about the importance of clean energy and clean water to lowa's economic growth.

IEC also co-hosted several clean energy advocacy days. Electric Vehicle Day on the Hill was held in March, where electric vehicle owners connected with policymakers to show the value of EVs and express support for pro-EV policies. Energy Efficiency Day in January featured contractors, nonprofits, and efficiency service companies that shared how their services save residents money, protect health and safety, and employ local lowans for this beneficial work.



Legislative Tours

Seven state legislators gained unique insight about the benefits of renewable energy through a series of legislative tours hosted by IEC's Energy Program and our partners. These tours took place in Boone, Lee, Marion and Polk Counties. Local leaders toured homes and businesses that implemented energy-saving efficiency measures such as LED lighting and improved insulation, farms controlling their expenses using solar installations, and more. Personal conversations with those benefitting from clean energy helps legislators understand the impact of their decisions and consider future policy improvements.



Action Alerts

IEC's success relies on the engagement of our statewide coalition. In 2019, IEC sent six Action Alerts to our supporters on issues ranging from the federal Waters of the US definition to state-level solar net metering policy. 1,840 lowans took action, generating 6,530 messages to city, state, and federal officials on laws and policies that would impact our environment.

Not all actions require a message to a legislator, such as submitting public comments on state agency reports or other content. IEC encouraged our engaged constituents to submit comments on the lowa DNR's proposed use designation of 109 river and stream segments, lowa DNR's draft 2018 Impaired Waters List (released November 2019), and the U.S. EPA's repeal of the 2015 Waters of the United States Rule.



IEC OUTREACH

IEC significantly expanded outreach activities in 2019, adding new events, engagement platforms, and tools to connect with lowans across the state. The Council itself grew in size, adding more members and supporters, new sponsors, and partners to our coalition.

IEC continues to position itself as a strong watchdog for lowa and a leader in using evidence-based research and collaborative partnerships to advance policy.



Media Coverage


In 2019, IEC's impressive work garnered significant media attention around lowa and beyond.

IEC was included in 160 stories and opinion pieces in a variety of print, radio, online, and on-air stories for our work including the Wind Turbines & Health paper, our Nutrient Reduction Strategy analysis, and more.

Notable coverage included The Guardian, CBS News, Progressive Farmer, major lowa newspapers, and others.

More lowans than ever were introduced to IEC and its work through new outreach events in 2019. The Water Program hosted a series of Women for Water programs, a new half-day educational program for women landowners in Perry, a breakfast at the Point to Point Swim in Okoboji, and the first annual End-of-Summer Beach Bash in Des Moines. The Energy Program hosted a number of solar and energy efficiency legislative tours around the state, in addition to the new Bright Ideas Breakfast and the Beneficial Electrification Summit.

IEC exhibited and sponsored at many events throughout lowa, such as Bur Oak Land Trust's Prairie Preview in Iowa City, the Iowa Governor's Conference on Public Health, the Des Moines Farmers Market, Cedar Rapids' EcoFest, the Northern Iowa Green Expo in Clear Lake, the Okoboji Blue Waters Festival, RAGBRAI in partnership with Niman Ranch, and the Blank Park Zoo Monarch Festival.

Our staff provided education and leadership as presenters at a number of community and industry-focused events, including the lowa IDEAS Conference in Cedar Rapids, a webinar with UNI's Center for Energy and Environmental Education, the 2019 National New Leaders Council Convention hosted in Des Moines, the lowa Association of Water Agencies, Des Moines' monthly Green Drinks group, and others.



ENERGY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS




Wind Energy Projects

IEC's Energy Program celebrated many successes in 2019, starting with the January 2019 release of the Wind Turbines and Health paper, published in conjunction with the University of Iowa's Environmental Health Sciences Research Center and the Iowa Policy Project. The paper analyzed peerreviewed scientific studies researching health effects of wind turbines, finding no evidence that wind turbine sound causes damage to human health.



Solar Energy Success

Clean energy supporters joined IEC in an unexpected battle during the 2019 legislative session following the introduction of a bill seeking to eliminate net metering for solar energy systems, among other changes that would decimate the burgeoning solar industry in lowa. IEC rallied supporters through action alerts, digital ads, and other tools, while the Council partnered with unlikely allies to stall the so-called "Sunshine Tax." The legislation did not advance during session and IEC actively engaged legislators and industry partners in the off-session to prepare for the next steps in 2020.



lowa Utilities Board Cases

IEC frequently participates as an intervenor in cases before the lowa Utilities Board (IUB) and 2019 was another year of work to ensure lowans would benefit from clean, affordable energy. Alliant Energy filed a rate case with the lowa Utilities Board, seeking to increase rates as much as \$20 a month for some residential customers. IEC partnered with the Environmental Law and Policy Center to call on Alliant to analyze its spending on fossil fuel generation, to set rates that encourage energy efficiency and solar, and to curb unnecessary spending on gold-plating the electric grid.

Our efforts brought Alliant to the table, where IEC and ELPC successfully negotiated a settlement approved by the IUB in January 2020. That settlement included Alliant's first-ever economic analysis of their coal plants, which will take place in 2020. IEC will push for a robust analysis that looks at the true economic costs of coal and the benefits of moving more guickly to a 100% renewable electric system.


Setting Numeric Limits


IEC Water Program staff continued to advance solutions to nutrient pollution in lowa's waters in their work in 2019. In February, IEC and Environmental Law and Policy Center argued in front of the lowa Department of Natural Resources' Environmental Protection Committee for their petition asking the state to set numeric criteria for nitrogen and phosphorus in lowa's recreational lakes. The petition was denied, but it was a critical step in the path to setting numeric limits.




Water Watch Continues

2019 was the second year of IEC's popular Weekly Water Watch series, an email newsletter tracking state beach advisories and highlighting important water news and research. The summer of 2019 featured a large number of high-profile algae blooms at popular public water bodies including Lake MacBride, Lake Rathbun, Spirit Lake and others. Correspondingly, dangerous microcystin toxin advisories were also on the rise in 2019. Our newsletter and stories highlighted the increased threats of these blooms and its impacts on public health and local economies.







Addressing Nutrient Pollution

IEC's groundbreaking publication *The Slow Reality of the Nutrient Reduction Strategy* increased pressure on policymakers to prioritize clean water. In July, IEC released data showing the implementation rates of conservation practices outlined in the lowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy (NRS) compared to what is necessary to meet the goal of reducing nutrient pollution by 45%. At the current rate of adoption, the practices analyzed were nearly 100 to more than 31,000 years away from reaching the scale necessary to reduce nutrient pollution by the state's goal. This publication gained significant media coverage, including reaction from the NRS's most ardent defenders



Drinking Water Contamination

The NRS publication came on the heels of an alarming report IEC released in conjunction with Environmental Working Group revealing the lack of private well testing in lowa and high frequency of contamination among the tested wells. The report reviewed 15 years of private well testing data and found that two-thirds of wells were tested only once in the 15 year period. Those that were tested were frequently contaminated with nitrate and/or coliform bacteria. IEC continues to share this important public health data in an effort to ensure safer, cleaner water for all lowans.

Pro H2O

Advocates for clean, safe water in lowa gathered for the 7th annual Pro H2O on Thursday, June 14, 2019, at The River Center in Des Moines. IEC's largest and most festive fundraiser of the year, Pro H2O celebrates lowans' collective work to protect lowa's waterways and honors individuals around the state for their work in protecting and preserving lowa's natural resources.

2019 honorees included an Innovation Award to Joe Bolick and Jennifer Trent with the Iowa Waste Reduction Center; Leaders in Business Awards to Big Grove Brewery based in Johnson County, SingleSpeed Brewing Company in Waterloo for their sustainability efforts, and Mollie Aronowitz of Peoples Land Management Company for her work to connect producer profitability with conservation; and the Tenacity & Youth Awards to Courtney Wolken, an A.P. Biology teacher with Newton Community School District and Steve Hopkins, nonpoint source coordinator with the lowa Department of Natural Resources, for their work increase awareness and engagement of a local water body.



Bright Ideas Breakfast

IEC hosted its first-ever energy focused event on September 26, 2019. More than 100 energy professionals, advocates, and community and business leaders gathered at the lowa Events Center in Des Moines for a breakfast featuring education, discussion, and awards.

Sonia Aggarwal, Vice President at California-based think tank Energy Innovation, led a session on the economics of energy generation in the US and opportunities for a carbon-free future. Local business leaders James Cade of Ruan Transportation, Chris Deal of MODUS Engineering, and Shashi Menon of EcoEngineers participated in a panel discussion on how energy policy impacts their industries.

The event also celebrated lowa businesses leading the way with clean energy adoption: Agri-Industrial Plastics in Jefferson County and Ideal Energy in Fairfield were honored with Business Innovation Awards. Jenny Steffensmeier of Steffensmeier Welding & Manufacturing received the Partner in Policy Award.

This new event helped to raise funds in support of IEC's Energy Program while celebrating the important energy advances being made in Iowa.












FINANCIAL REPORT


The Iowa Environmental Council is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, nongovernmental organization.
